





Notes on March 29th Luncheon

Jonathan's in Ogunquit was the setting. Art historian and author Deborah Child who is the Portsmouth Athenaeum Proprietor was the speaker. A relatively obscure Portsmouth-born 19th Century artist - one John Samuel Blunt (1798-1835) - was her subject. Sounds rather pat? But "pat" is hardly the word for the immense research project (an on-going one) diligently undertaken - a project resulting in a 2007 exhibition of the artist's oeuvre at the Portsmouth Historical Society, a beautifully illustrated and informative book *The Sketchbooks of John Samuel Blunt*, a publication of the Portsmouth Athenaeum (also for sale at River Run Books in Portsmouth), as well as a work in progress, namely a catalogue raisonne which, hopefully, will fill in more gaps about this interesting artist's legacy.

Via commentary surrounding colorful visuals of atmospheric landscapes of a bygone era including marine paintings and well-executed sketches of the Piscataqua region as well as stylistic portraits, Deborah Child discussed the surfacing of such works along with background information about her subject, who certainly is not a household name, left few notes but who, fortunately, had descendants whose trail led to discoveries, the most important of which was a treasure trove from "Aunt Florence's Trunk" which turned up in Colorado and included the artist's ledger/day book. During her presentation, she noted differences/similarities surrounding unsigned portraits attributed to the artist, his mostly signed landscapes and his known sketchbooks. She also touched upon auction prices achieved for Blunt's art, an exhibition of works attributed to him as the Borden Limner (i.e., as the artist who painted portraits of Captain Daniel Borden and his wife of New Bedford, Massachusetts), and



previous writing by noted art connoisseur Nina Fletcher Little in recognizing this artist.

During his short life, John Samuel Blunt lived in Portsmouth, Boston and Texas and tragically died of yellow fever while traveling via ship from New Orleans to Boston. His legacy is important to the Seacoast area, for, through his sketches and related paintings, as Deborah Child indicated, aspects of the early 19th Century history of the town can be reconstructed - i.e., harbor scenes, buildings no longer in existence, etc. - especially through major paintings such as the artist's "View of Portsmouth from Freeman's Point, circa 1830."

Bessie P. Makris – June 6, 1920 – January 13, 2008

I always noticed Bess' house in York – on 1A, York Street, at the end of Route 103. You couldn't get to York Harbor without passing by and thinking of Bess. On a sunny day in the summer, she was sitting there, usually either talking on the phone or napping in the sun, surrounded by her geraniums. Interesting that Micky Robinson

had similar thoughts to mine "I remember Bess sitting peacefully outside her house with her red geraniums on a TV tray in front of her. She sat in the sunshine until the end of October watching the world go by." Micky and I are both New Yorkers and we take note of the peace of sitting in the sun and red geraniums. I often envied Bess that warmth from the sun and the time to enjoy it.

As I was driving home on Sunday afternoon, January 13th

I noticed a police car in front of Bess' house and this afternoon was different. It was winter and I knew that Bess had been in the hospital. In fact Bess died that Sunday afternoon watching the Patriots on television. She was independent until the end and died peacefully at home. Cathy Trent: "Bess loved sports, mostly her Red Sox. She really was a great fan and had gone to Red Sox games when she was very young. After the Red Sox won and the Patriots started playing she was right there watching every game. No one better call her while either game was on TV."

Cathy said that she remembered Bess saying to her that "joining IWCNE was the best thing she ever did." She said the club became her family as so many ladies did special things for her just like a family. The list would be endless but Cathy Trent, Gwyneth Wykes and Cathy Trent should head the long list of those caring for Bess...doing all those things that we take for granted. Cathy, Gwyneth and Barb gave unflinchingly so that Bess could remain independent.

"She was a very generous lady" said Cathy. Bess was a

generous supporter of St. George's Episcopal Church in York Harbor and St. Nicholas Greek Orthodox Church in Portsmouth, NH. And she did not forget her roots in Cambridge, MA and the Greek Church there. We know how generous she was with IWCNE and our charities. Bess contributed countless bottles of wine, wrote checks for Pot Lucks and rarely missed a Saturday luncheon over the many years. She supported IWCNE charities with her generous donations. And she supported us all with her warm smile and presence.



How can you look at a photo of Bess at a Pot Luck sitting on a sofa without smiling? There she was with her eyes twinkling, smiling at all of us and thoroughly enjoying whatever food she was eating. I remember keeping her fortified with soup at the Christmas Fair last year. She'd give me the high sign and

I'd bring over a sample of a different soup from the kitchen. After she'd tasted them all, she'd pronounce judgment about which one she liked the best. And she thanked me weeks later...with a smile she said "Dorothy, thank you for the Smorgasbord of Soup."

Micky Robinson said "All of her old family photographs were extraordinary. I wish I could see them again." We can thank Barbara Poulin for hunting down all of these wonderful photographs. And special thanks to Bess' nephew Will who did a lot of hunting himself and willingly shared the originals with us to scan. Do you remember the luncheon last year when Bess brought the original of the formal photograph of her in the traditional Greek dress? We were all enraptured...and Barb wouldn't rest until we had the image scanned for the Newsletter.



I particularly like the Pony Ride photo. I think I have one on the same pony! Does anyone do pony ride photos anymore?

Enjoy the photographs – Bess and George on the Pony, the beautiful High School Graduation portrait 1938; Bess at York Beach in the 1950s; Bess at wedding in 1953. Wasn't she stunning?



Bess had a long career in Cambridge, MA. She worked in "the Square" at the Harvard Coop for sixty plus years! As I understand it she was "forced" to retire. "Not seeing a major reorganization coming there she recalls crying for days after being "let go".

Betty Williams remembers a conversation when Bess was remembering her work days in Harvard Square. "She said that the best part was leaving the Coop after work, walking

the few blocks to the Sheraton- Commander and having two martinis at the bar." Then she'd continue up Concord Avenue home. Another favorite thing was the Wine Dinner at Cape Neddick Inn here in Maine. Betty describes Bess as a "trotting on her feet" kind of a gal.

Don't you know exactly what that means? Can't you hear Betty saying it?

Gwyneth Wykes spoke at Bess' prayer service at the Lucas & Eaton Funeral Home in York on Wednesday, January 16th. "Bess and I became friends through our membership in the International Women's Club of New England, many more friends of hers who are also members are here today - we all have a deep and abiding appreciation of the friendships and associations we have developed during our membership over the years, none I would venture to say appreciated them more than our friend Bess.

She was somewhat physically incapacitated in later years and walking was somewhat difficult, but with the invaluable assistance of some devoted member friends she was able to attend most of the Club functions. She had a quiet determination about being as independent as humanly possible throughout even the most difficult days of sometimes poor health. We admired and respected her for that.

I know of no other situation where while being treated as an inpatient at York Hospital for congestive heart failure and other medical issues she miraculously was to persuade the medical powers that be to be released for the evening and to be picked up by a devoted member of the Club to attend a Pot Luck dinner and then be returned to the hospital at the end of the event. The nurses that had helped her put on a little make-up earlier in the evening now assisted her back into bed. Very little would prevent Bess from attending Club functions.

We all enjoyed her sharing her life stores about her youth in Cambridge, MA and her beloved Greek traditions. She epitomized the creed of our Club to honor our backgrounds.

When we go out or stay with friends
we have memories to share.

The saddest time is going home
and knowing you are not there.

We think of you with many new days
in April or December.

We wish that we could turn to you
and say "Do you remember?"

We used to talk about the past
and people we had known.

The problems and the happiness
and how the years have flown.

So we will hold those memories
and friendship's undying embers.

Though we may not hear your voice
we will know that you remember.

We learned so much from Bess – about being independent and optimistic when life and health issues can be difficult."
